The Bible and the World Cup?

You won't be surprised to hear that the Bible doesn't have a lot to say about the World Cup or football! There are the sporting references to the Olympics, with Paul urging people to stay true to Jesus and run their race like an athlete (2 Timothy 2 / Philippians 3).

There is one reference to a 'ball' which is when Isaiah speaks God's judgement against Jerusalem in Isaiah 22. Obviously this isn't a sporting kind of Bible verse (although it does suggest ball games, possibly even bowls!) But the verse is actually a very serious one:

'Beware, the Lord is about to take firm hold of you and hurl you away, you mighty man. He will roll you up tightly like a ball and throw you into a large country."

There are a few more Bible verses about 'cups' (but mostly the ones you drink from, not the ones you win!) There is one funny reference to Pharaoh being presented with a cup but this is by his cup-bearer (the one who taste tested Pharaoh's drinks), so not really that funny...

Genesis 40:11 - Pharaoh's cup was in my hand, and I took the grapes, squeezed them into Pharaoh's cup and put the cup in his hand.'

David, his team and his game

If you've watched a football game, you'll know that the game can turn one way and then the other way. One team plays well for a while, then the other team plays well. Anything can change in a game - a red card seeing a player sent off or an injury or a sub coming on to the pitch and scoring a goal.

Back in 1 Samuel 30 there was no football game going on but things seemed to be going one way and then the other for David...

David and his guys were a winning team. They had some of the best of the best. Some of the men were a bit rough round the edges but David was a great leader. He led his men to victory after victory - they were the champions! But headed off to fight another battle, their new teammates weren't keen to fight alongside them, doubting they could be trusted. So David and his army weren't allowed to even 'play'. They were banned and kicked out of the competition - kind of like a World Cup side being booted out of the World Cup!

1 Samuel 30.3-8 and 17-20 - When David and his men reached Ziklag, they found it destroyed by fire and their wives and sons and daughters taken captive. So David and his men wept aloud until they had no strength left to weep. David's two wives had been captured – Ahinoam of Jezreel and Abigail, the widow of Nabal of Carmel. David was greatly distressed because the men were talking of stoning him; each one was bitter in spirit because of his sons and daughters. But David found strength in the Lord his God. Then David said to Abiathar the priest, the son of Ahimelek, 'Bring me the ephod.' Abiathar brought it to him, and David enquired of the Lord, 'Shall I pursue this raiding party? Will I overtake them?' 'Pursue them,' he answered. 'You will certainly overtake them and succeed in the rescue.'

David fought them from dusk until the evening of the next day, and none of them got away, except four hundred young men who rode off on camels and fled. David recovered everything the Amalgamates had taken, including his two wives. Nothing was missing: young or old, boy or girl, plunder or anything else they had taken. David brought everything back, 20 He took all the flocks and herds, and his men drove them ahead of the other livestock, saying, 'This is David's plunder.'

So David and his men got back to the 'team hotel' (Zigzag, where they lived) and found that it had been raided and destroyed. They had lost everything - all their possessions and their wives and children. They'd been stolen by the Amalgamates. David's team-mates were even talking of not just taking the captaincy away from him; they wanted to kill him! David was absolutely gutted. So he went to God first and found strength in God. There are tough things that happen in every game (and in life) but your best place to get fired up again is by going to God who never leaves you and always has a Plan A game-plan for you!

God's plan for David was to go get the Amalgamates and recover everything that had been lost. David was up for the plan and assembled his team together and off they went. But some of his team dropped out on the way, exhausted and probably fed up. So here's question for you: when things look like they're going wrong, how do you react? Do you keep on going or give up? The Bible says we walk by faith not by sight. This means that we recognise what's going on (even if it's bad) but we trust God, knowing he's got things in hand and is working things out for good.

David went after the opposition. He wouldn't lie down and accept defeat (a good policy for life!) Instead, he actually won back all of what had been lost. It was like a football game where he was 2-0 up, then the opposition scored 3 goals, but then he came back to win 4-3! He even managed to control some of his team-mates who wanted to take their celebrations too far.

So here's the main lesson from this - we keep on going no matter what happens (it's called 'perseverance'). We stay strong and loyal to God at all times. He'll help us if we go a bit wrong - if we're losing or even score a bit of an own goal! God says in Romans 8.28 that God works out all things for good for those who follow him. So as we follow God and represent his team, we should know we're on the winning side. No matter how things look - God is there and God will bring us through to the victory parade in heaven!
